fulfilled as recorded in the New Testament? (e.g., Isaiah 7:14; Matthew 1:22-23). Were you convinced by His sinless life? (Hebrews 4:15). Were you convinced by His willingness to shed His blood to save you from your sins? (Romans 5:8-9).

What convinced you? "For since the creation of the world His invisible attributes are clearly seen, being understood by the things that are made, even His eternal power and Godhead, so that they are without excuse" (Rom 1:20), "The fool has said in His heart, there is no God" (Ps. 14:1).

We urge you to objectively examine the abundant evidence for the existence of the God of heaven and earth. Your eternal destination depends upon accepting who God is and His love for you. Take the advice of the wise Solomon who wrote, "*Remember* your Creator before the silver cord is loosed, Or the golden bowl is broken, Or the pitcher shattered at the fountain, Or the wheel broken at the well. Then the dust will return to the earth as it was And the spirit will return to God who gave it" (Eccl 12:6-7),

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WHO'S NUMBER ONE By Joe Slater

"I have to look out for Number One!" That's another way of saying I must concern myself first and foremost with my own interests. After all, if don't, nobody else will – right? Far too many Christians have yielded to that worldly philosophy. Paul lamented, "For all seek their own, not the things which are of Christ" (Philippians 2:21).

What does it mean to seek the things of Christ? The prior two verses tell of Timothy's genuine care for the welfare of the brethren at Philippi, in sharp contrast to the self-seeking attitude of virtually everyone else. To act in the best interests of Christ's people is to seek the things of Christ.

Earlier in his letter Paul had exhorted the Philippians, "Let each of you look out not only for his own interests, but also for the interests of others" (2:4). That's the very thing Jesus did, as shown in 2:5-8. Leaving heaven in order to give Himself to die on the cross as the supreme atonement offering required extreme humility and the endurance of unspeakable pain. Jesus did it because it was in our best interest.

In Matthew 6:33 Jesus didn't tell His disciples to "seek first your own interests (i.e. look out for Number One). Instead, He said to "seek first the kingdom of God and His righteousness." How seriously do we take Him when making decisions? Do we think first of what benefits the cause of Christ? Do we consider what impact (for good or for ill) our decision has on other people? The title of this article asks, *Who's Number One?" As the statement "I have to look out for Number One" is commonly used, Number One is you. Let's switch that around and make Jesus "Number One." Let's seek the things which are of Christ!

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FISHERS OF MEN

Don Marquis once said, "Our idea of fishing is to put all the exertion up to the fish. If they are ambitious, we will catch them. If they are not, let them go about their business."


When it comes to evangelism, this quote often proves all too true. Some Christian's idea of being "fishing for men" is to simply to sit there and hope for the person to come to them. Little effort is put forth. Little is done to start conversations or pursue possible contacts. We get scared. We get busy. We get nervous. We want all of the exertion to be done by the "fish," not ourselves. And yet, no matter our feelings, it still
